



Virginia Overton

Virginia Overton will create a site-specific installation, originating in an intuitive and direct response to the majestic and unrivaled Neo-Brutalist space of MOCA's Great Hall. Through a process of trial and error, Overton creates sculpture that responds actively to the architecture of a particular environment resulting in an installation that is simultaneously dramatic and minimal. Imbued with an ethos of economy, her way of working synchs fortuitously with Tucson's abundant supply of detritus and industrial remnants. Her fondness for elemental materials and frequent use of found or discarded objects will manifest itself during a residency at the museum leading up to the exhibition.



Virginia Overton was born in Nashville, Tennessee in 1971 and lives and works in Brooklyn, New York. Her solo exhibitions include: The David Ireland House, San Francisco (2017); The Whitney Museum of American Art, NY (2016-7); The Aldrich Museum of Contemporary Art, Ridgefield, CT (2016); White Cube, London (2015 and 2016); Storm King Art Center, Mountainville, NY (2014); Kunsthalle Bern, Swit zerland (2013); The Power Station, Dallas, TX (2013) and The Kitchen, NY (2012). She has participated in numerous group exhibitions and projects including Lever House, NY (2017); ICA Philadelphia, PA (2016); Art Basel Parcours, Switzerland (2016); Pier 54, High Line Art, NY (2012-13, 2014); and MoMA PS1, NY (2010).

Chuck Nanney | Selected Ambient Works, Volume II

In the Video Room and South Galleries, Chuck Nanney will exhibit sculptural and sound works comprising a mini-retrospective of recent activity. Frequently protruding from the walls, painted vividly, and installed at various heights, the works have a Calder-like ability to playfully blend stability and mobility. Intermixing minimalist tendencies with a distinctive rough-hewn quality, the works' brightness and joviality are complemented and belied by a devotional quality that speaks eloquently of survival. The sound works are composed of cut-up poetry and experimental pulsing pop melded with airy drones that accompany the visual display.



Chuck Nanney was born in Memphis, TN, in 1958, and lives and works in Oakland, CA. Solo exhibitions include Jenny's, Los Angeles CA; Debs & Co., New York NY; and Galerie Jousse Sequin, Paris, France. His work has been shown in numerous group exhibitions, most recently as 30/130: Bob Nickas at White Columns, New York, NY; Another, Once Again, Many Times More at Martos Gallery, New York, NY; and Readykulous by Ridykelous at the Contemporary Art Museum, St. Louis, MO.

Tucson John | Tucson Nights: After Dark in the Naked Pueblo

Tucson John's photographs of Tucson house parties, musical events, and downtown demimonde from the mid-2000s to the present will be collaged and wallpapered floor-to-ceiling creating an all-over, immersive document of living history. The earlier photos depict unbridled exuberance and wayward nightlife amongst decrepitude and desolation before the current onset of "revitalization." Pointedly, that spirit and irrepressibility is not limited to events a decade ago, and by including recent work this exhibition traces an arc through to the here-and-now. proof of ongoing vitality that hasn't been stamped out by normalization. Underground, chaotic merriment lives on, and by straddling the past and present, Tucson Nights: After Dark in the Naked Pueblo resists sentimental nostalgia while acknowledging a change from an era of liberty and a literal space to create a scene outside the parameters of predetermined development. The exhibition comments on the global and societal shift from untamed, guileless abandon and lack of self-consciousness, to the ubiquitous use of camera phones and social media that has fostered universal narcissistic hyper self-awareness.



Tucson John was born in Trenton, New Jersey, and travelled the world doing fashion and event photography before discovering and settling in the Sonoran Desert in 1994, where he continues to photograph and act as cultural impresario and ambassador for Tucson.

A night on the edge of forever: The art of midnight films, free theater and the psychedelic underground San Francisco 1969-1973 | Curated by Steve Terry

Guest Curator Steve Terry is a collector, editor, and publisher of Wild Life Press, specializing in limited edition books, printed matter and audio releases. For this exhibition, Terry presents posters, flyers, artworks, photographs, and books related to a group of artists, filmmakers, and performers who were active in the San Francisco avant-garde of the late 60's and early 70's. Centering on the activities of Steven Arnold, Todd Trexler, The Cockettes, Sylvester, and the Angels of Light, the works document creative fertility amid the protest movements, utopian communities, and the experimental counterculture of the mid-20th century. Within a larger context of social and political history, these materials also record a period in the Bay Area where an increasingly liberated gay movement started to raise consciousness and attain mass awareness. Of primary focus is the "Nocturnal Dream Shows"—pioneering weekly showcases at the Palace Theater. These shows brought together a heady mix of midnight movies, radical theater, and pansexual anarchy that featured the first public performance by The Cockettes, early solo performances from Sylvester, and West Coast



premieres of now classic counterculture movies. Additionally, the presentation highlights the evolution of the aforementioned artists connected to the "Nocturnal Dream Shows," bringing to light their work leading up to and following the events at the Palace Theater to provide a wider scope of the scene at large.


4th Friday Films with The Loft Cinema



Friday, June 22 | Frida

The life and career of one of Mexico's most prominent, iconoclastic painters comes to the screen under the guiding hand of producer/star Salma Hayek and director Julie Taymor in the Oscar-winning drama, Frida. Hayak ages some 30 years onscreen as she charts Frida Kahlo's life from feisty schoolgirl to Diego Rivera protégée to world-renowned artist in her own right. Frida details Kahlo's affluent upbringing in Mexico City, and her nurturing relationship with her traditional mother and philosophical father.




Friday, July 28 | The Salt of the Earth



Brazilian photographer Sebastião Salgado has documented some of the most horrific and catastrophic events on our planet — famine, disease, deprivation, war and genocide — as well as the stunning endurance, courage and nobility of those who face it. Scarred by his experiences, he returned to his family's drought-ridden farm and managed to reinvigorate it through a system of experimental replanting. The success of this endeavour inspired his new photographic project "Genesis," which seeks to capture the beauty and grandiosity of those landscapes still unspoiled by human intervention.

Friday, August 25 | Pollock

Directed by and starring Best Actor Oscar-nominee Ed Harris, Pollock is an intense, beautifully-crafted drama about the legendary American painter, Jackson Pollock. Fellow artists and lovers, Jackson Pollock (Harris) and Lee Krasner (Best Supporting Actress Oscar-winner Marcia Gay Harden) are at the center of New York's 1940s art scene, but as Krasner neglects her work to push Pollock's career forward, Pollock begins to unravel emotionally. Pollock and Krasner escape to the country and marry and, soon, Pollock creates work that makes him the first internationally-famous modern painter in America. But, with fame and fortune, comes a volatile temper and severe self-doubt; before long, Pollock's life threatens to explode.



Friday, September 22 | Wasteland



Filmed over nearly three years, the Oscar-nominated documentary Waste Land follows renowned artist Vik Muniz as he journeys from his home base in Brooklyn to his native Brazil and the world's largest garbage dump, Jardim Gramacho, located on the outskirts of Rio de Janeiro. There he photographs an eclectic band of "catadores" — or self-designated pickers of recyclable materials. Muniz's initial objective was to "paint" the catadores with garbage. However, his collaboration with these inspiring characters as they recreate photographic images of themselves out of garbage reveals both the dignity and despair of the catadores as they begin to re-imagine their lives.
